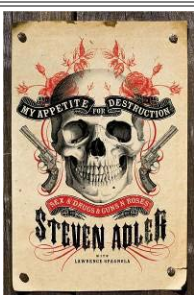

Steven Adler, **MY APPETITE FOR DESTRUCTION: SEX, AND DRUGS, AND GUNS N' ROSES** (304 pgs) 7/27

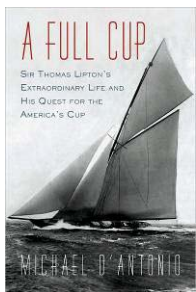
Adler, the original drummer with the rock band 'Guns N' Roses', played with them from 1985 until 1990. He shares his personal perspective on life in the band and his struggle with a 20-year addiction to drugs, a suicide attempt, and the financial ruin he faced after being kicked out of the band.

Rosanne Cash, **COMPOSED: A MEMOIR** (264 pgs) 8/10

Having been surrounded by music her entire life, it's no wonder the daughter of June Carter Cash and the man in black, Johnny Cash, chose to go into the music business herself. Rosanne writes about her childhood, her development as an artist, her role as a mother, how she dealt with the death of her parents, and more. "This work is a rare treat, as Cash, firstborn to country music legend Johnny Cash, is not only a hereditary celebrity musician, having made scores of albums and #1 singles, but a terrific writer in her own right." **Publishers Weekly**

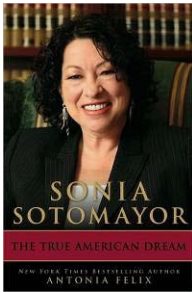

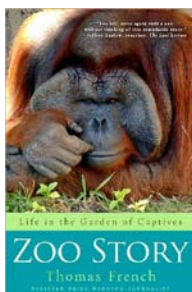
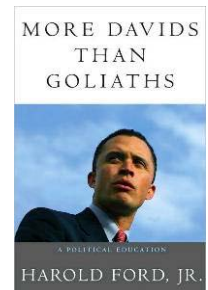


Antonia Felix, **SONIA SOTOMAYOR: THE TRUE AMERICAN DREAM** (320 pgs) 7/06

In 2009, Sonia Sotomayor made history by becoming the first Hispanic to be appointed to the U.S. Supreme Court. In the first definitive biography of Sotomayor's life, Felix tells how the daughter of Puerto Rican immigrants living in the South Bronx rose to that pinnacle.

Harold Ford, **MORE DAVIDS THAN GOLIATHS: A POLITICAL EDUCATION** (256 pgs) 8/10

Ford has been described as a charismatic, results-oriented politician with fresh ideas and a pragmatic approach. 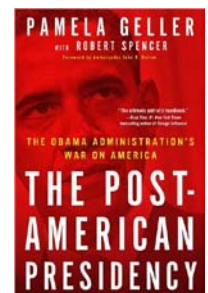


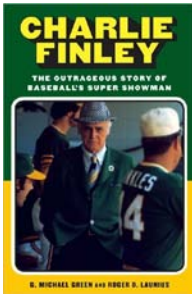
Thomas French, **ZOO STORY: LIFE AND DEATH IN THE GARDEN OF CAPTIVES** (304 pgs) 7/06

French confronts some of these thorny issues as he reveals the complexity of zoos from Florida to Swaziland to Panama to New York. 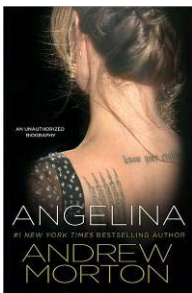
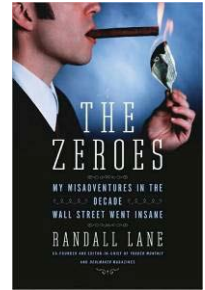

In the early 1970s, the Oakland Athletics were one of the most successful, colorful, and chaotic baseball teams of all time. They were all of those things because of Charlie Finley, the A's owner and general manager. Drawing on interviews with players, family members, and colleagues, the authors present the first full biography on Finley. "Most readers will agree with the authors' final assessment that Finley was an innovative, infuriating jackass whose braying was sometimes sensible, even wise." *Kirkus Reviews*

Randall Lane, **ZEROES: MY MISADVENTURES IN THE DECADE WALL STREET WENT INSANE** (368 pgs) 6/29

Magazine entrepreneur Lane had a prime seat at Wall Street's biggest greedfest after being pulled into the crazy, self-contained world. He witnessed first-hand the excesses and bad behavior, how fortunes were made and spent, and the dozens of high-profile personalities who tried to cash in on the feeding frenzy or found themselves in the middle of it.

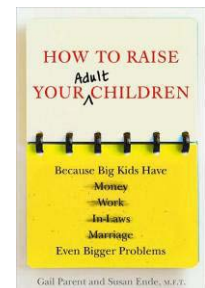


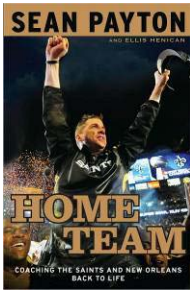
Andrew Morton, **ANGELINA: AN UNAUTHORIZED BIOGRAPHY** (336 pgs) 8/03

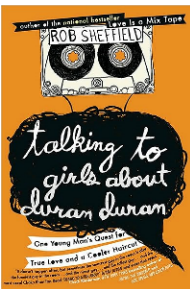
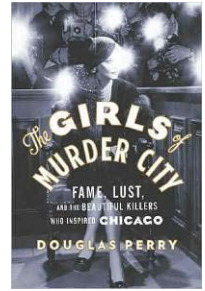




Sean Payton & Ellis Henican, **HOME TEAM: COACHING THE SAINTS AND NEW ORLEANS BACK TO LIFE** (304 pgs) 6/29
Four years after Hurricane Katrina devastated New Orleans, the New Orleans Saints paid tribute to citizens by winning their first-ever trip to the Super Bowl where they defeated the heavily-favored Indianapolis Colts. This is the story of their journey and of the coach who taught them how to win and brought life back into New Orleans.

Douglas Perry, **GIRLS OF MURDER CITY: FAME, LUST, AND THE BEAUTIFUL KILLERS WHO INSPIRED CHICAGO** (320 pgs) 8/05

The movie 'Chicago' won six Academy Awards in 2002. Fans later learned that it was based on a real-life event in the 1920s. Perry tells the story of Maurine Watkins, a fledgling reporter for the 'Chicago Tribune,' who went to Cook County Jail to interview the women charged with the crime of passion: Belva Gaertner and Beulah Annan.



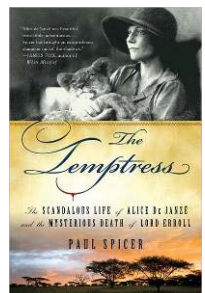

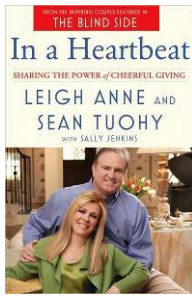
Sheffield returns to the music of his youth and shares the soundtrack that helped him evolve from a gangly, Catholic altar boy into the romantic hero readers met in his first book, 'Love is a Mix Tape.' He celebrates the 80s and things pertaining to it, from the music of Bowie to the Replacements to Prince and

Paul Spicer, **TEMPTRESS: THE SCANDALOUS LIFE OF ALICE DE JANZE AND THE MYSTERIOUS DEATH OF LORD ERROLL** (272 pgs) 7/20

Alice de Janze, an American multi-millionairess, scandalized Paris in the 1920s by leaving her French husband for an English lover whom she later tried to kill in a failed murder-suicide. Then she moved to Kenya, where she became the lover of Joss Hay, Lord Erroll. In info gathered from personal letters and extensive research, Spicer pieces together Alice's scandalous life. 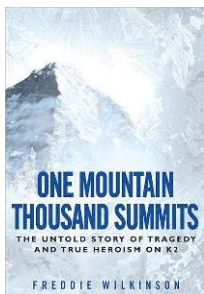
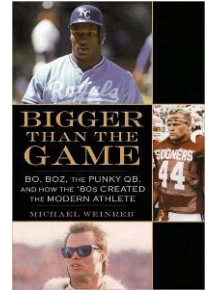

Long before the bestselling book and the Oscar-nominated movie 'The Blind Side,' there was Leigh Anne and Sean Tuohy and their family, which included Michael Oher. The Tuohys take readers on a journey of faith and love, teaching unforgettable lessons about the power of cheerful giving, which not only changed Michael's life, but theirs, too.

Michael Weinreb, **BIGGER THAN THE GAME: BO, BOZ, THE PUNKY QB, AND HOW THE '80'S CREATED THE MODERN ATHLETE** (352 pgs) 8/05

The decade of the 80's in sports could be described as one of greed and excess, where the love of the game shifted to the love of money, and athletes made the transition from representing honor and humility to becoming brash and branded. Weinreb captures stories of the headliners from that era who led the way in creating the modern athlete.



Freddie Wilkinson, **ONE MOUNTAIN THOUSAND SUMMITS: THE UNTOLD STORY OF TRAGEDY AND TRUE HEROISM ON K2** (352 pgs) 7/05

After 11 men died on the slopes of K2 in 2008 the media scrambled to get the story from the survivors. Unfortunately, because of exhaustion, hypoxia, and hallucinations, none of them could relay what happened. Yet, the Sherpa guides, who could have shared the details, were ignored by the press. Following interviews with the guides and families of the lost climbers, Wilkinson presents the story of what happened.

Dave Zirin, **BAD SPORTS: HOW OWNERS ARE RUINING THE GAMES WE LOVE** (240 pgs) 7/20

Zirin claims that the fastest growing sector of today's sports audience is the alienated fan. Complaints abound: from inflated ticket prices, six-dollar hot dogs, and nine-dollar beers, to owners endlessly demanding new multi-million dollar stadiums funded by public tax dollars. He presents a hard-hitting look at the tough times beneath the glitz and hoopla of professional sports.
